Grade	Summary
A+	Liver Damage (Fibrosis) Restrictions: Fee-For-Service (FFS) and Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) do not have any liver damage restrictions. Sobriety Restrictions: FFS and MCOs do not have any sobriety restrictions. Prescriber Restrictions: FFS and MCOs do not impose prescriber restrictions. Recommendations to Improve Patient Access: Continue to provide access to hepatitis C treatment to all beneficiaries. Maintain coverage parity across the Medicaid program and transparency regarding coverage requirements. Grade Rationale: Washington Medicaid excludes hepatitis C medications from MCO contracts and FFS requirements apply across the Medicaid program. As a result of legal action and patient advocacy, the state has no liver damage, sobriety requirements, or prescriber restrictions. Because Washington allows beneficiaries to access hepatitis c treatment without submitting a prior authorization form, a plus has been added to the state's A grade.

Background

As of September 2020, Washington had 1,849,899 individuals enrolled in Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program.² Washington's Medicaid program, known as Apple Health, operates a Fee-For-Service (FFS) program and contracts with five Managed Care Organizations (MCOs),³ Most beneficiaries, 93 percent, are enrolled in a MCO plan. 6 percent participate in FFS and 1 percent are in a Primary Care Case Management program.⁴ Apple Health contracts with the following MCOs: Amerigroup, Community Health Plan of Washington, Coordinated Care of Washington, Molina Healthcare of Washington, and UnitedHealthcare Community Plan.5 Hepatitis C medications are paid for by the FFS program and the FFS coverage requirements apply across the entire program regardless of MCO enrollment.⁶

State of Medicaid Hepatitis C Treatment Access

Apple Health has dramatically increased access to hepatitis C medications due to legal pressure and patient advocacy. Previously, the state required severe liver damage (F3 or greater) to qualify for treatment.7 A class action lawsuit was filed against Apple Health by Columbia Legal Services, Sirianni Youtz Spoonemore Hamburger and the Center for Health Law and Policy Innovation (CHLPI) of Harvard Law School on behalf of Medicaid patients who were denied access to hepatitis C treatment due to the state's severe coverage restrictions.8 In May 2016, a U.S. District Court Judge issued a preliminary injunction on Apple Health's liver damage restrictions. 9 The parties settled the case in November 2016 when Apple Health agreed to eliminate the fibrosis score requirements, moving forward for at least three years. 10 Subsequently, the state has made even greater improvements to hepatitis c access by removing all treatment access restrictions. Additionally, the state's preferred agent, Mavyret, is covered for beneficiaries without the need to submit a prior authorization form. 11

Sobriety Restrictions

Apple Heath does not have any sobriety restrictions.

Prescriber Restrictions

Apple Health does not impose prescriber restrictions.
