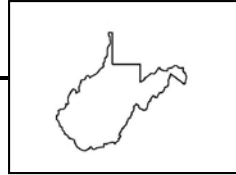


Hepatitis C: State of Medicaid Access Report Card

West Virginia

Estimated Number of Individuals Living with Hepatitis C: 20,600¹



Grade	Summary
B-	<p>Liver Damage (Fibrosis) Restrictions: West Virginia does not impose liver damage restrictions.</p> <p>Sobriety Restrictions: FFS and MCOs require three months' abstinence from alcohol and substance use.</p> <p>Prescriber Restrictions: FFS and MCOs require a prescription to be written by or in conjunction with a specialist.</p> <p>Recommendations to Improve Patient Access:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Remove sobriety and prescriber restrictions.• Maintain the "carve out" of hepatitis C medications from MCO contracts and continue applying FFS coverage requirements across the Medicaid program. <p><i>Grade Rationale: West Virginia provides moderate access to hepatitis C treatment without regard to liver damage. However, the onerous sobriety requirement deters many individuals from accessing treatment and fails to address the public health impact of hepatitis C on the state's opioid crisis.</i></p>

Background

As of July 2019, West Virginia had 528,876 individuals enrolled in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).² The state operates a Fee-For-Service (FFS) program and West Virginia's Bureau of Medical Services contracts with five Managed Care Organizations (MCOs). The MCO program operates under the name "Mountain Health Trust."³ 77 percent of beneficiaries participate in Mountain Health Trust, while the remaining 23 percent are enrolled in FFS.⁴ However, the state has excluded hepatitis C medications from MCO contracts and covers them under the FFS program for all beneficiaries.⁵

State of Medicaid Hepatitis C Treatment Access

Though West Virginia has modestly improved access to hepatitis C medications, coverage criteria remain restrictive. The state has "carved out" hepatitis C medications from MCO contracts. FFS coverage criteria now apply to all beneficiaries across the state.⁶ Effective October 1, 2019, the state no longer imposes any minimum liver damage restrictions.⁷ The updated criteria requires new diagnoses to be confirmed by submitting two viral RNA tests dated six months apart with the prior authorization request. West Virginia requires three months abstinence and beneficiaries must sign a *Patient-Provider Agreement Form* acknowledging the importance of sobriety and that the patient may be required to submit a drug screen if the provider so determines.⁸ Additionally, prescriptions must be written by or in conjunction with a gastroenterologist, hepatologist or infectious disease specialist.⁹ The criteria notes that consultations are permitted through Project Echo. West Virginia's preferred drug list covers Eplclusa, Harvoni, Mavyret, and Zepatier as preferred, and Daklinza, ledipasvir/sofosbuvir, Olysio, sofosbuvir/velpatasvir, Sovaldi, Technivie, Viekira Pak/XR, and Vosevi as non-preferred.¹⁰

Liver Damage (Fibrosis) Restrictions

West Virginia FFS and MCOs require at least moderate liver damage (F2 or greater).¹¹

Sobriety Restrictions

West Virginia requires three months abstinence and beneficiaries must sign a *Patient-Provider Agreement Form* acknowledging the importance of sobriety and that the patient may be required to submit a drug screen if the provider so determines.¹²

Prescriber Restrictions

West Virginia requires that hepatitis C medications are prescribed by or in conjunction with a gastroenterologist, hepatologist or infectious disease specialist.¹³ Consultations are permitted through Project Echo.
